It's Not What You Know, But Who You Know

"He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes on ahead of them, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice." John 10:3-4, NIV

When someone testifies at the end of an Ellel course, "I really know God loves me", it's one of the most precious things they can say. They may not have received the specific healing they were seeking, it might be that in one sense nothing has changed for them, yet, when the awe and wonder expressed in the famous Charles Wesley hymn, fills a person's heart, everything changes:

And can it be ...
Amazing love! How can it be,
That Thou, My God, should'st die for me?

What brings about such a radical transformation? What facilitates that deep knowing in our heart that through the shed blood of Jesus we really are unconditionally loved, and that by His Spirit our Heavenly Father really is with us and for us, whatever we might be facing?

It's not about gaining more head knowledge. After all, the Pharisees had all the theology, but when Jesus healed the man who was born blind, they were more concerned that He had violated their legalistic Sabbath rules than they were about the wonderful miracle He had performed. And as Jesus went on to talk about Himself as the Good Shepherd, we are told 'the Pharisees did not understand what He was telling them' (John 10:6). The Pharisees knew every letter of the law, but they completely missed the heart of Jesus and the heart of the Father.

Perhaps the key for us, is giving our Heavenly Father time ... setting aside quality time for Him to impart, not head knowledge, but heart knowledge: those powerful truths of who He is and who we are in Him, so that they really permeate our inner being. Learning to recognise and know His voice. Taking steps in growing in hearing that 'still,

small voice 'above all the noise and commotion of the world, above the busyness of our lives and above the noise of our emotions that can be full of things like: fears and worries, anxiety, and the pain and hurts in our lives.

Jesus, reflecting the heart of the Father, spoke about the sheep listening to His voice, how He calls each one by name and leads them out to the rich pastures of the abundant life He provides, how He goes ahead of them, not driving them from behind and how His sheep follow Him because they know His voice. We have such a caring, personal Heavenly Father, who doesn't just want us to know about Him, He longs for us to hear Him and really know Him.

Perhaps today He is calling us to set aside time, to allow Him to impart more of His precious truth into our hearts: the truth that through Jesus you truly are His adopted child and how He longs for you to have that assurance of acceptance and belonging in your heart in a yet deeper way, and knowing that you are completely safe and unconditionally loved in Him. The Pharisees knew far more theology than the man born blind, but they didn't know the Father. But the healed blind man met with Jesus and truly knew the Fatherheart of God.

"I have hidden Your Word in my heart, that I might not sin against You." Psalm 119:11, NIV

Truly, the Lord has given mankind an amazing gift with the ability to remember things. With our memories, we can recall places we've been to, people we've met, and even their voices, and this helps us recognise them when we meet them again. From earliest childhood, we're taught to memorise multiplication tables and recite them, and we store huge amounts of information in our memories, which can be tapped into any time we need it.

When I became a Christian, I was given the above Bible verse on a parchment bookmark. I've long since lost the bookmark, but I remember the verse!

I've recently been away on holiday with my husband, and we went to Norfolk, where we used to live, so we could visit family. On one day, we wanted to go to Norwich. We had arranged to visit a friend for lunch, and were hoping to fit in a later visit to another friend the same day. The Holy Spirit reminded the Gospel writers of things Jesus had said to them. But the Holy Spirit can only remind us of God's Word if we memorise it and take it into our hearts. Tearfund News

This week we are launching Tearfund's Big Bake – a powerful way of engaging with the issues around global poverty and to raise money that will be used to fund life-transforming projects. Flour power

Sahira* was born in the Central Asian States where life is tough. HIV, drug abuse, unemployment, family breakdown, crime and violence are all on the rise. Poverty is widespread and Sahira's parents were unable to care for her, leaving her vulnerable and alone.

An orphanage provided a safe place for Sahira but Lev and Zarina, who run the orphanage, knew that she, and the other girls they were looking after, needed more than just a home.

When the time came for girls to leave the orphanage they were unable to find work and 90 per cent of them were falling victim to trafficking and other crime. The girls needed a safer future and that meant skills and the possibility of work.

With training and support from one of Tearfund's partners, Lev and Zarina started a baking course for the girls. Lev was then given a cash grant that he used to buy ovens and other baking equipment.

This is making a huge difference, giving Sahira and others the skills and confidence to build safe lives – free from the exploitation that was inevitable without this opportunity.

Meanwhile in Twickenham

It was a damp day in October and the rugby was on. Hoods up and shoulders hunkered, the rugby fans streamed into the ground at Twickenham. But as they passed one particular garden, their day was brightened by the sight of bunting, balloons and an abundance of cake.

Tearfund supporter Debs is one of a whisk-beating, sprinkle-shaking army using their baking skills to end poverty across the world through Tearfund's Big Bake. She knows the power of a good cake. And it's not just good for rugby fans – it's good for a young girl like Sahira as well.

Realising she'd get a good flow of people going past her home on match day Debs set up a stall in her front garden. She wasn't afraid to be as visible and vocal as possible. With great gusto she proclaimed to the passing throngs: 'Get your cupcakes here! Three for the price of two! Roll up roll up!'

The cake sale went well. Debs and her family raised a fantastic £200! That could train and equip another person like Lev to provide a safe future for many more young people like Sahira.

It's a piece of cake

Debs has this advice for anyone who wants to do what she did: 'Engage young people from your church to make your cake sale mobile – go and get the passing traffic – use big trays! Above all, enjoy the experience and smile lots – its great fun!'

Cake is good, let's face it. It brings people together, it's fun to make, it tastes awesome. And you don't even have to bake – you can buy! We have amazing bakers (and buyers) holding cake sales whenever, wherever and however they choose and each one bakes a big difference.

The Twelve Disciples in 12 Months Number Seven

These are the names of the twelve disciples: first, Simon (who is called Peter) and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him. [Plus his replacement Matthias]

Andrew, a disciple of Jesus and the brother of Peter

In Matthew's Gospel, Simon Peter is the first disciple called but in John's Gospel it is **Andrew** who is called first and then he brought his brother Peter to Jesus. It appears that there were two disciples who were followers of John the Baptist and John the Baptist spotted Jesus on walk about. The next day John was there again with two of his disciples. When Jesus passed by, John the Baptist was heard to remark, "Look, the Lamb of God!" This caused the two followers of John to leave him and follow Jesus.

Jesus must have sensed that he was being followed for he turned around and confronted the two, wanting to know what they wanted. This meeting resulted in the two spending the day with Jesus. **Andrew**, Simon Peter's brother, was one of the two. The first thing **Andrew** did was then to find his brother Simon [Peter] and tell him, that they had found the Messiah. **Andrew** then took his brother to Jesus. The summons to become disciples of Jesus occurred at a later date. **Andrew** and his brother were both from the town of Bethsaida, in Galilee.

Andrew had a positive outlook in life, unlike some of the other disciples such as Phillip. There was a time when Jesus saw a great crowd coming toward him, he said to Philip, "Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?"

Philip responded with the following statement, "Eight months' wages would not buy enough bread for each one to have a bite!" **Andrew**, on the other hand, spoke up and said, "Here is a boy with five small barley loaves and two small fish." It was only a small amount of food, that the small boy had but **Andrew** thought it worthwhile to bring it to the Masters attention.

As we now know, it was just the information that Jesus was seeking. It was from this information that Jesus was able to feed the thousands that were present that day.

Phillip seemed to have a good relationship with **Andrew**, for when some Greeks made a request of Phillip to see Jesus, Philip did not go and tell Jesus of the request, but rather, he went and told **Andrew**. It was most probably **Andrew** who made the decision for them both to then go and approach Jesus with the request that the Greeks made.

Was **Andrew** the first home missionary? See John c1 v41 Was **Andrew** the first foreign missionary? See John c12 v22

It is thought that **Andrew** was crucified on a diagonal cross [X] rather than the traditional cross and as every Scotsman reading this knows, Saint **Andrew's** Day is November 30th. The Scottish flag is a white Saint **Andrew's** crux decussata [a white diagonal cross] on a blue background. As to why the Scots have St. **Andrew** as their patron saint is beyond me. Perhaps a Scot could write to Connect and pass on any relevant information that they may have about the matter. Perhaps **Andrew** played golf!

Andrew and Phillip both had a different approach to Jesus in the above. Phillip appeared not to want to approach Jesus first and Andrew not only spoke to Jesus, but he spoke about what should have been an impossible task. The negativity and positivity of these two disciples only help us to understand ourselves. Are we negative or positive about situations? Do we bother to communicate with God about situations or do we consult with other people? Are we timid about approaching God or bold? It matters not what we think or what others think for the scriptures say that we may approach God with freedom and confidence. [Ephesians c3 v12]

The reason we can approach God is because of Jesus. One of the most positive portions of scripture to reveal this to us is found in Hebrews where it says, "Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has gone through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathise with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are-yet was without sin. "Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need." [Hebrews c4 vs14-16]

The Worship of God in the Whole of Life | Whole Life Worship

And now, Israel, what does the LORD your God ask of you but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in obedience to him, to love him, to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and to observe the LORD's commands and decrees that I am giving you today for your own good? Deuteronomy 10:12-13

You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they were created and have their being...' In a loud voice they were saying: 'Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honour and glory and praise!' Revelation 4:11 and 5:12

It should come as no surprise that the Lord of the whole of life requires worship in the whole of life. In the Old Testament, we see it in regulations that touch on every aspect of daily existence, in psalms which embrace the highs and lows and everything in between, in prophets who call for justice and mercy as well as sacrifice and singing. As Deuteronomy 10:12-13 captures it; all of life was to be an expression of service to the Lord.

That's completely in line with what Paul says in Romans 12:1-2 — where bodies, minds and wills are offered back to God — reminding us that the Old and New Testaments stand together on the necessity of whole-life worship. Across Scripture, acceptable worship is not simply a matter of praising God in music and singing, or of participating enthusiastically in rites and ceremonies; it involves honouring, serving, and revering God in every sphere of life.

And it all flows out of his grace towards us. The biblical story from beginning to end allows us to trace the acts of God on behalf of the people of God and our response to the Lord in worship.

In the book of Revelation, John sees a door standing open in heaven. He's given a vision of reality from God's perspective. For the small and weak communities of believers scattered around the Roman empire, John sees that the true account of the world is revealed not only in the Creator God who *reigns* over all things, but in the Christ crucified who *redeems* all things.

The worship that John witnesses nourishes our identity and mission as the body of Christ – because it's focused above all on Christ himself, who is uniquely qualified to bring to pass God's redemptive purposes in the world. The scope of what God might be pleased to do through us in our everyday lives, even this day, is rooted in what God has done, is doing, and will do for us and for all creation.

So, John's vision of worship becomes a *call* to worship, an expression of allegiance in a world of competing allegiances, a way of declaring who's really in charge, as we allow our worship of God and the Lamb to permeate everything we think and say and do, and invite others to do the same.

Moving Forward

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9, ESV

These words must have been as comforting to Joshua as the mantle now passed to him, after Moses' death, to lead the children of Israel forward into the Promised Land.

It is also God's command and promise to each of us as we move forward in our personal journeying with Him, especially if the road ahead gets difficult, or unexpected storms come across our path. Jesus further instructs and encourages His disciples to 'abide' in Him, and if we are where He wants us to be, in His plan and purposes, then we can be reassured and at peace, since nothing takes Him by surprise, as He knows the way ahead, and has the bigger picture. Unexpected circumstances can often test our level of trust and resolve, but our Heavenly Father is always watching over us.

Maybe He is asking you to step out of the boat into a new venture, or new season, and you're feeling quite nervous. Don't worry. He's riding the ocean waves and with your hand in His, He's there for you as He was for Peter. He wants you to enjoy the journey and not be afraid of it. You are in the safest hands in the universe. He won't drop you!

Or maybe you have received some disappointing news, from an unexpected source. Remember, He knows the way through the wilderness or through the desert. He parted the Red Sea for the Israelites, and He will show you the way forward.

Or He may just be asking you to stand by your post like a soldier on duty at Buckingham Palace, and He wants you to trust Him with the length of service, however short or long that may be. The heat of the day may encroach on the spiritual armour you need to wear (Ephesians 6), but keep all pieces of your armour in place, for it will both protect you and enable you to combat approaching enemy attacks in testing times. Never ever give up.

No matter our circumstances, we are instructed to keep to the narrow way (Matthew 7:14), for it is the way of life. Each of our journeys is unique to each individual, but the presence of our Lord Jesus is with us personally in all of our circumstances, and we have His promise that He will never leave us nor forsake us.

In John Bunyan's 'Pilgrim's Progress', 'Christian' chose to ascend the hill 'Difficulty', though clambering on his hands and knees, for it led to life, while his two companions chose what seemed easier routes, but which ended in catastrophe. Easier options will often present themselves when there is a choice to be made, but the way of the Lord must be the only choice for those who belong to Christ.

Whatever each day brings, know that you can trust Him, for He is trustworthy, and He is 'with you to deliver you' (Jeremiah 1:8).

The faceless crowd has become a common and accepted part of life on this planet. It is often so easy to become calloused, indifferent, and unmoved by the lost condition of those around you. Isaiah knew that one of the best ways to develop a passion for souls is to ponder the destiny of lost men and women.

Where are they going? And what awaits them there if no one cares enough to confront them with God's love and their own lostness?

The thought of judgment coming upon his countrymen caused Isaiah to bow in prayer and then move into action. What about you? Go back to the window for another minute, this time to pray for those you count. You cannot reach them all, but can you reach one today?

Ask God to give you boldness and a door of opportunity to do precisely that.

Nobody's Nobody

"He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love."

Ephesians 4:16, NLT

During our creativity courses, everyone joins in doing a corporate project together. We each have a piece of card the same size and shape. It's sometimes a sheep-shape, and we all decorate it to make it personal to us, a representation of who we are. Then we put all our little sheep together on a background that represents the sheepfold. By the end of the weekend, we are always amazed at the diversity, every single sheep is different, no two are even similar, and no-one knows whose sheep is whose. It's such a great picture of the Body of Christ: everyone unique and precious, all on equal footing, no one 'sheep' any more important than any other.

Paul tells us that in all our differences and diversity, we each have our own special part to play in the Body, and in doing it we each help the others to grow, so that the whole Body is healthy and growing and full of love (Ephesians 4:16).

The problem is, sometimes we just don't think we have anything to offer. Knowing this, Paul writes about different parts of our physical body, the foot and the ear, as if they feel insignificant and unimportant. He even makes it sound as if the foot is jealous of the hand (1 Corinthians 12:14-27)! When you think about it, our hands are usually seen, whereas feet are often hidden in shoes under a desk or table. We put hand cream and rings on our hands, not so much our feet. Hands can write, draw, paint, play a musical instrument, craft beautiful woodwork or masonry, embroider an intricate tapestry or cook a delicious meal. You can understand how it would be easy for the foot to look at those gifted hands and think, 'I don't matter! No-one notices me! I don't belong. I might as well give up.'

Of course, the truth is: the body struggles without a foot. Feet are very important. If your church only had the pastor and no-one else, how would it function?

No-one to put the chairs out or serve the coffee.

No-one to sit on the chairs or drink the coffee.

No musicians.

No corporate praise and worship.

No-one to share relationship with, to listen, to care and pray for one another.

No-one to pray for the work of the church.

No-one to connect with our families, neighbours and friends.

No-one to take the love of God out to the world around us.

Nobody's nobody in the Body of Christ. Just as God doesn't ask a foot to be a hand, He only asks you to be who He made you to be, the unique and individual person you are, and to exercise the precious gifts He's given you. So, whether you're the leader or one of those precious people serving faithfully and quietly behind the scenes, as you do the special work God has given you to do, you're helping the other members grow, so that the whole Body can become healthy and growing and full of love.

Blossom Where You Are Planted

"And I will provide a place for my people Israel and will plant them so that they can have a home of their own and no longer be disturbed." 2 Samuel 7:10(a), NIV

Recently, my wife and I noticed that hydrangeas planted in our garden produced quite different coloured blooms from those planted in the cemetery next to us. They weren't a different species, but the soil they're in contains different nutrients.

We'd noticed the same thing at our previous house, where we fostered many cats and kittens over the years. My wife would rinse out the litter trays at the outside tap, on a daily basis, prior to sterilising them, and then pour the water on to an adjacent large hydrangea bush. This then started to produce bright blue flowers on that side, while the other half remained pink!

This got me thinking about where God plants us. We know we're supposed to blossom there by using the gifts God's given us. But, what happens when He moves us somewhere quite different? The tendency is to assume that we're to operate in the same way in our new location, but if the soil (or environment) is different, then that may not work. We must be prepared to adapt. We must allow God to develop within us new gifts and capabilities which suit the environment we're in, and not expect the environment to change to suit us. In the same way, we may need to put aside the gifts and abilities we've used to great effect in the past, because they don't fit our new location.

Wherever you are today, God placed you there. It may not be a permanent placement for your life, but it's the place of His choosing for right now. He knows who you are, and, because He knows all about you, He's decided where you'll grow best, to beautify His garden. He'll always seek to place you in situations which will allow you to be the most productive and fruitful. However, being the good gardener He is, He doesn't just yank us out by the roots. There may be a period where He prunes us, and shakes the roots to loosen them before re-planting, us or setting us aside for a while. Sometimes He may give us a severe pruning, as we did to some plants in our garden; to fit them into pots,

in preparation for moving them to a new house we're hoping to buy. Interestingly, now their roots have recovered, these have grown new shoots and are doing much better now than when they had their own space in the garden, where they sometimes bloomed un-noticed, or were becoming crowded out.

It may not be a new location you find yourself in, but a new season. If so, the same guidelines apply. Most plants don't bloom in the depth of winter, but they're preparing for the spring that's coming. Likewise, the spring and summer seasons aren't the time to be dormant. Let the Holy Spirit guide you into where, how and when to blossom.

God's looking for people who're willing to allow Him to make an impact through them in their little piece of His garden. He isn't necessarily asking you to travel to the ends of the earth to make a difference, but He does expect you to blossom right where He's planted you. You're never in the wrong place to serve God. You just need to be willing to adapt to where you're planted.

Update on the Chinnor Good Neighbours Scheme

The Chinnor Good Neighbours Scheme (CGNS) has continued to undertake more help to the Chinnor, and local villages, residents.

Over the last year (1 May 2016 to 30 April 2017) the number of times CGNS has assisted persons has increased from 498 to 678. The number of clients helped continues to rise. Last year there were an extra 32 new clients.

In the four months from 1 May 2017 to 31 August 2017 we have assisted 352 persons. It seems likely that we may break the 1,000 assists by 30 April 2018.

In total, since 1 May 2011, when the scheme started, CGNS has assisted residents 2,559 times.

If you know of anyone who may benefit from CGNS help please ask them to ring 01844 353500. **FREE** fridge magnets are available from John Haywood.

Also available free are the Lions donated Emergency Boxes. They are little green and white boxes that are put in the fridge and contain information concerning a person's prescription etc. A sticker is placed on the front door and on the fridge to indicate to any emergency or medical personnel that such information is available for them to look at.
